

Pronouns Relative Pronouns in Use

A Pronoun replaces a noun. The pronoun is used when we don't know a more specific name or word for the noun. A relative pronoun introduces a dependent clause that modifies (gives more information about) a word, phrase, or idea in the independent clause.

Example: I am always frustrated by people **who** talk while watching a movie.
